The Ire of Man TT – an advertorial

The first event of the year if the Ire of Man – someone is bound to have something to complain about with a competition – which is the second event I've run for the Classic Rally Club, following the Buckett List Tour in 2020. As with that event, my intent has been to string together some great driving roads and, as golf is a good walk ruined, the Masters and Apprentices will have a great drive slightly spoiled by some navigation.

As it will be three months on from the Alpine Classic, it will be a great opportunity for a social catch up, especially for those not able to make the Sydney club meetings. So there will be a social function on the Friday night, yet to be confirmed, but I'm expecting it to be in Kingston-Griffith area (about 2 km south-east of Parliament House). The start location is at Narrabundah College, with is less than 3 km from there, and there are quite a few accommodation options in the area (unlike if we were to start in Tuggeranong).

The route will take us through Cooma and Dalgety and then on to Merimbula for our overnight stay. Although some of you might enjoy a long stretch of dirt road, there will be a kind of transit section on the Monaro Highway to Cooma. Don't worry, I won't have you looking for questions on a major highway, but I do have some ideas to keep the crews occupied in a safe manner.

There are some great roads after Cooma, with most of them being 100 km/h zones, which will reduce the time in the car compared to other events. Dinner on Saturday night will be at the Merimbula Wharf Restaurant and Aquarium, which will be a main and desert meal similar to the Alpine Classic this year.


I would normally go with an own choice meal, possibly at a club, but I was warned that a few options were a bit average. And this way we will get the place to ourselves.


Sunday will have more great driving roads in the escarpment west of the coast. Lunch will be at the finish at the Cooma Car Club's Museum, which has a large function area. This will give those who want to, plenty of day light to drive back to Sydney, for example.

At this stage, with route yet to be finalised, the crews in all categories can expect a few short sections of dirt. Two have been graded since October, so the surface condition is likely to be quite good. The sealed roads are generally better in terms of fewer potholes than the roads we've had during CRC events this year.

I'm also taking up Tony Norman's suggestion of offering a social mapped navigation option, which would use the Apprentice instructions, but be ineligible for any prizes. Being the second event I've run, I have a better idea on how to make it just hard enough — but there will be at least one loop for Mike Batten. I only joined the club in 2015, so I don't know where events went previously, but there haven't been any around the Sapphire Coast during my membership, and being a multi-day event, there will be more time for social interaction across the meals. The Aquarium and Museum also make this event a bit different, so I think you'll find it very enjoyable if you enter.

The CRC Alpine Rally 2022

Finally, the rally we had been waiting for, since COVID and Lockdown, had arrived.

The Alpine Classic.

Glenn and I decided that to spend a weekend in the Central West driving the Porsche 928 GT would be an excellent way to give the Beast a good run on some great country roads and catch up with our CRC family. But the rains came and with that floods, inundating areas of the Central west, isolating and destroying communities, crops, livestock, homes, people's livelihoods, people's lives and the roads.

Right up to the final hour, reccies of the road conditions were being made and drivers could make the decision on the day as to whether they drove their classic car or swap it for their every day driver. Glenn and I made a pact. We would take the Beast and if the roads were too hard, we would go to the next section.

As it turned out, thanks to Glenn's experienced driving and a bit of channelling from Shane we managed the entire rally OK. To be fair there were a few grimaces from Glenn, sideways glances and a continual parroting from me of, "Is the car ok Glenn?"

After the traditional breakfast of great bacon and egg rolls, the traditional breakfast of a CRC Rally, that was repeated the following morning at Pizza Cravings at Dubbo with the rolls and bacon and egg pizza and their signature donuts doing the rounds; you would think that we would know by know how to get out of the Lithgow Public School and with Tour notes to boot. Our first mistake was at 00.00 kms, making the wrong turn. The Glenn and Jen Team were off with their typical start.

Within the field of cars, there was a fair representation from the classic cars despite the predictions of some dodgy roads on route. Driving into Lithgow Public School there were plenty of memories for me, one of which was Lui's last Alpine

as Director which was run during the Lithgow fires. We had a briefing including cautions about safe driving in that climate and in particular, being careful about parking on the side of the roads. 'Dry grass and hot exhausts do not mix.' Ashley and family were living in Lithgow at that time and I remember Sarah bringing Cordelia and Jack who was 3 at the time, to see all the special cars as a bit of a distraction from what was going on in the local community.

From fires to floods, now there were warnings about the road conditions around the areas we were to rally in, last minute route changes to avoid the badly damaged roads, and the encouragement to stop in the towns for a coffee to support the communities. This was easily done as this Alpine Rally was not a timed event. (The first time in its history?). So, of course Glenn and I readily took advantage of this suggestion whilst we were in Gulgong.

'Please enjoy the drive along Goolma Road (this is a route diversion due to the recent flooding events). Take time to admire the historic buildings of the "Town on the Ten Dollar Note'. Plenty of places for a coffee/break if you so desire.'

We so desired, and after checking in at the Mansell's Passage control, we turned a corner and completely missed John and Wendy's M control. Apparently, John was frantically waving at us too. We enjoyed a coffee and a vanilla slice whilst studying the \$10 note in depth. Yes, I still carry the legal tender of Australia in my purse and continue to make purchases with it. Glenn and I then did a little shopping at a little craft shop attached to the Banjo Patterson Museum. Meanwhile, back at the M control John and Wendy were waiting....and waiting...

Back in the car, pleased that we had supported the community of Gulgong and confident that we wouldn't be too early for lunch at the Cudgegong

Cruisers Clubhouse (and we weren't) we drove into M control for John to greet us with open arms with; 'Finally! Been waiting for you guys! Could have bought us a coffee! We made our way sheepishly to thelunch stop at the Cruiser's Club. Another great lunch with great sausages, (they were from the local butcher) and salads. I didn't have cake, to full of vanilla slice! The lunch stops on these rallies are magnificent. The work and effort that goes into them is second to none. We drove up to Canobolas Primary School on day one and walked into the hall. The lunch was set out with crustless sandwiches, antipasto boards, salads, cakes and fruit. Beautiful and all accompanied by tea dance music. But this was Orange, this was wine country and the only thing that was missing was a bottle of Rolling wine.

The Banjo Patterson Country was full of sculptures, and animals with bikes, animals on bikes, bikes on

animals and bikes in trees. We were traveling the tourist route in Central NSW between Molong and the Dubbo Zoo and answering questions on the Paddock Art that was started by local farmers and

their wives, the bus driver, Men's Shed, kids, playgroup mums- anyone with an artistic air and an imagine could have a go. You had to have an imagination to decipher some of the animals to answer some of the questions. But we saw two real camels lazing in the paddock just past M7. We knew what they were!

But the roads...

The majority of the roads were good. Cudos to the Organising Committee for managing such a tricky terrain, with plenty of warnings at the briefing, in



the route instructions and on the road. I thought I had seen enough and hit enough potholes driving in the Hawkesbury. There were pot holes, more pot holes and more rough stuff with double and triple cautions.

LEG 1 of the rally and 17 kms in we drove two consecutive dips and at 32 kms and an added caution of rough road was made. It continued into LEG 3 with added cautions of a crest with an unsighted pot hole, then rough for 4 kms. All before lunch on day one. These types of conditions

became the norm over the weekend. For me looking out for pot holes became a priority over questions, getting the animals on bikes correct and spotting P boards.

The dinner on Saturday night at the Dubbo RSL was great and the traditional Heather Dux Raffle was continued on with prizes donated by Carol Both and Alan and Lauren Walker, the proceeds going to Flood Relief.

Thank you to Alan and Lauren Walker and Phill Stead for all the hard work of organising this longawaited weekend and the rally in such variable conditions and to the Officials manning Passage Controls. The lollies were great. It was a fun weekend.

How To Not Quite Win The Alpine

Is it really all about winning a Sheepstation?

John Cooper picked it as we came into his control in Gulgong on the Sunday morning, saying something along the lines of "You've won enough events already this year, but you're not going to win this one". He could see that we hadn't visited Tina and John at their nearby control. Less than an hour earlier I'd said to Andrew that with the route changes Phill had had to make, it was going to really difficult to make up ground during the Sunday running. Especially as it was clear that Hill End was on the route — we had a town map — and that meant one logical route if using sealed roads for much of the afternoon. So I was thinking I'd blown it when I'd taken a 30 point hit after already being behind on Saturday night.

On the map it was quite simple: find the bend in the Castlereagh Highway at the southern edge of the built-up area and drive NNNE for approximately 750 m, turn to the east, and then make another right turn and the control should be in front of us. Unfortunately for me, I had no idea that Castlereagh Highway had been realigned to the southwest by about 450 m since the map was drawn. The previous trustable mapped feature was 4km earlier, so when the road sign indicates you've reached the highway, I'd no idea that I wasn't on the mapped road. Especially as Phill had told us there were no Z boards to look out for on Sunday.

The main north-south road that then leads east to Ulan (Cope Road) appears has a different route now than how it is mapped as well. Seeing I had the main road out of town, I forgot to check the heading. All up, according to Google Earth, I would have driven 2 km of unmapped roads, all while following the current main roads in the shortest way, to drive what scaled as 1 km on the map. We did see some Tour cars using some different roads, but as the event was untimed, Phill did have some

flexibility to make us go different ways. If we'd followed them, it would have been the easiest way to understand what was going on, as I'd never been to Gulgong before, let alone tried navigating around it in a prior CRC event.

Back in the Wondaiah rally, I'd spotted a Tour car coming out of a junction that made me reconsider one of Ross' instructions, and found a control that a few others missed, so I won't complain if any of my competitors used cars from other categories as hints. I don't bother bringing other maps with me, and my NSW map book doesn't have a Gulgong town map in it anyway, but if I'd had such a map and looked at it that could have made a critical difference in spotting the realignment of the Castlereagh Highway. The rest of the Masters and Apprentices all found the control, so that made a big difference to my score.

A bigger faux pas was getting a question wrong when our answer didn't fit the provided letters. Ian and John in the MG RV8 would have seen our white BMW come up on them quite a few times in the rally, one of which was on the run into Orange during leg 3. We'd stopped to check on Michael and Geoff as their E-Type was given them some fuelling issues, and a bit later we were doubling back after passing the MG looking for a question we'd missed. Somewhere in that, we'd concluded another sign fitted what should have been Cockatoo Lane. A bit harder to get right was a string of questions about animals and bikes. Phill mentioned that Google was used for some of the distances as the route had to change at the last moment, but I don't know if the kangaroo on the bike was one of those, but we didn't find it, unlike some other crews. But we got the next two, so in general our distances were about right.

On day one, I missed two Z boards for road realignments, one near Wallerawang that I was

never going to find unless explicitly told to look there (as the Apprentices were). We'd been told there were only six for the day (turned out there were five). Hendo found it, but I'd back him finding one in an area where he's set rallies, while I've never been on that road before, and I was struggling just to be sure of the new road. The second Z board we missed was in Molong. I didn't have a strong enough sense that something might be up as we turned south towards and immediately into John's control location. I had the feeling I'd missed something, but unlike some, we didn't spot the hidden board after it was too late.

In Division 4 we'd had a clean run to Bathurst, apart from being stuck behind a not quite fast enough Landcruiser ute for longer than was enjoyable. That didn't help my map scaling, but I found the critical turn to Peel without an issue, and we got to apologise to Jon for not visiting his and Tina's morning control in Gulgong. After that we had a final control chat with Paul on the way into Bathurst. We only found the slightly longer of two mapped roads into the control, for reasons I don't really understand looking at it later, as we drove past an obvious looking road before going back, but Paul said using either mapped road was deemed to be fine. We were the first Masters crew to the control and we arrived at the finish about on time, had it been a timed event.

At the finish I got to see that John and Robbie had clean sheeted division 3, so with our missed control penalty that put Andrew and me about 45 points behind with division 4 still to be scored. So it was a surprise to see that when the provisional results had come out that we were the provisional winners, one penalty ahead of both Mike & Dom and John & Rob That changed on the following Sunday night when Alan called me to say there had been a change of results and I was now second behind Mike and Dom. After a general chat about running events, we got onto supplementary regulations at which point I remembered section on the priority of the instructions. This led to Alan

thinking about the scoring again, and I went to bed with the possibility of winning again.

I got up the next morning to see that the final results were published and we were second, on a countback on the age of the car. Guilty as charged on that one, as I'd got the BMW in its first year of competition eligibility in 2018, partly with the intent of having a car as well suited to the events as possible, e.g. comfortable to get to the events and back. The car is about 75% of my age, so my 1988 535i car may be older relative to its owner than Robbie's GTV. As we were only fighting over trophies, the loss of the win was quickly forgotten. There was a note for the record books that I missed, as with a win and the scoring system allowing the two worst days of rallying to be dropped, Andrew and I would have achieved a maximum possible score of 100 out of 100. Not a perfect year, but I was able to get away with most of my mistakes. One area where Andrew and I were unusually poor this year was in getting our observation answers correct, something that carried over to the Alpine. Probably best that we don't try competing in Tour until we improve.

At the presentation day and Christmas Party, there was a further surprise as the Sheepstation Trophy for the Alpine winners came out with Andrew's and my names on it. I guess that came from the provisional winners list, so there's one trophy that says we've won — it will end up with joint winners — and another I get to keep that says I came second.

Which all seems fitting given the obstacles, Phill, Alan and Lauren had in putting the event on with false starts with COVID and the recent flooding requiring route changes. It would have been nice to see a larger field, but it was great to catch up with those who did compete. My thanks to the organisers and I fully intend to have another crack at winning the Alpine next year.

John, Peter and Tony have lunch at the Australian Motoring Heritage Foundation (AMHF)-

Yes it is true, on December 7th your Executive Committee visited the AMHF at the Eastern Creek Circuit., and a working lunch was part of the proceedings.

If you didn't know, the AMHF is using the former premises of the Australian Racing Drivers Club, which is located close to the end of grandstand, on the outside of the main straight. Those of you who have been to Sydney Motorsport Park- as the whole complex is now known, probably know this building – which has been converted into a library/archive of material that relates to the technical and social history of motoring, particularly in Australia, from its beginnings.

We inspected the huge range of material from marque specific books, to motor sport chronicles, old race meeting programs and much more. Collectively the history of motoring is a HUGE subject and it is great to see that a concerted effort is being made to collect and conserve this material, and save it from disposal. Life-time collections are coming to the AMHF for evaluation, and this is far preferable to having this irreplaceable printed matter go into the recycling bin when dad or mum, or even a car club- passes away.

Currently staffed by volunteers, this venture will establish a resource which will be invaluable to future car club members, researchers and history buffs. Because the motoring age hasn't officially died (yet) this type of facility is sort of playing catchup with similar ventures that have existed for considerable periods to preserve subjects such as railway or aviation history. For example the Rail Museum at Thirlmere- a small township well known to rallyists for having SO many way in or out-had its beginnings in 1962.

The aviation museum at Albion Park Airport- HARS is also well established, and longer term CRC members may remember two CRC visits to the Temora Aviation Museum- which featured

prominent attention to the era of warbirds. So HOORAY, motoring history is going to get similar attention, to collect and retain its history, before it is too late.


The CRC should and will encourage these efforts by the AMHF and watch this space (in Rally Directions) for updates. In the short term the AMHF is organising the conduct of a survey which aims to properly estimate the size of the special interest motoring movement. It is already known that almost half a million people nationally are members of car clubs, or have an interest in motoring/motorcycling beyond using a modern bread and butter vehicle to go to the shops/work etc. This survey will be a tool to demonstrate the size of

this group, and what sort of money its puts into the economy.

The survey will be on-line, and the time taken to complete it is expected to be about fifteen minutes. Some or perhaps many CRC members will be able to be part of this research.

Conditional Registration of Historic Vehicles

The scheme is designed to allow historic vehicles (more than 30 years old) to be registered under conditional registration which provides limited usage of the vehicle and also provides Compulsory Third Party insurance cover both at a very reduced cost. The Classic Rally Club is very grateful to the RMS and the relevant Minister for the scheme which allows the preservation of historic vehicles for road use without incurring the cost of full registration and insurance. The scheme works very well so long as it is not abused; it is not intended for day to day driving such as driving to work, going shopping, commuting to the railway station or driving the kids to school. The introduction of the 60 day log book trial allows members to enjoy 60 days use of the car for driving sake. The Classic Rally Club will not tolerate any abuse of the scheme by club members.

Types of Conditional Registration available to CRC members

- Historic Vehicle Registration H Plates (HVS)60 day log book which allows 60 days per year use plus club events This an accord between the RMS and individual car clubs
- An annual signature and club stamp required to ensure you are a financial member of the CRC RMS Form for HVS 1259
- Classic Vehicle Registration (CVS) similar to above but with modification allowed provided they are certified by and engineer's report. This is an accord between RMS and the CMC /ACMC An annual club RMS form for CVS 1835
- 4. Rally Registration for outright rally cars, note this is the only way cars with full roll cages can be registered in NSW.

When your renewal with the RMS falls due, they will send you a new Historic Vehicle Declaration form. You MUST have that form signed by the Club Plate Registrar, so allow enough time for this to be done before your registration falls due.

Procedure for renewing at the RMS:

- Get a pink slip. (The preferred option) You need to send a copy of the pink slip to me.
- A return stamped address envelope would be appreciated.
- Fill in the Historical Vehicle Declaration and mail to me. Email copies not permitted by RMS. Alternatively you can complete the writeable PDF on the RMS web site and that can be emailed to me but it needs to be posted back.
- Club Plates Registrar will complete Section 4. and sign
- Take or post your Conditional Registration renewal and pink slip to RMS or Services NSW for processing.

Don't forget that all movements of your car, other than those set out in the constitution, must be logged with the Club Plates Registrar or logged in your logbook if your car is on the 60 day scheme to ensure your CTP insurance is valid. To log in vehicles not on the 60 day scheme contact me on mobile 0403 037 137 or email rondcooper1275@gmail.com.

Club Rules in addition to RMS Conditions

The scheme is designed for Classic Rally Club members who will be active in club events not just to provide cheap registration as per the overview of the scheme.

The club reserves the right to withdraw eligibility to those who do not participate in club activities.

Members should be financial members for 12 months prior to applying for club plates.

Members with club plates must comply with all RMS conditions and club rules and directions from club officials.

The club reserves the right to accept or reject any cars and to withdraw acceptance to the Historic and Classic Plate schemes.

In addition to the RMS costs the Classic Rally Club charges members on the HVP scheme \$25 per year and require them to sign a document annually requiring members to agree to the conditions of the scheme and to provide information on the insurance of their vehicles.
